Abraham Lincoln

Overview and Rationale

The purpose of this lesson is to have the students learn the history and biographical information of Abraham Lincoln by comparing facts from a *Picture Book of Abraham Lincoln* by David A. Adler and the Library of Congress website. This is important because it teaches the students about a former U.S president and how to verify information.

Objectives

The students will:

- Learn biographical facts about Abraham Lincoln
- Learn how to compare and contrast facts from the book and internet websites through a Venn Diagram

Materials

- A Picture Book of Abraham Lincoln
- A computer
- Paper
- Pencil

Procedure

- 1. Read A Picture Book of Abraham Lincoln aloud in class
- 2. Discuss the book and list facts the students found throughout the book on the board
- 3. Have the students copy them onto their piece of paper
- 4. Have students research more about Abraham Lincoln through the websites given to them and write down facts for their Venn Diagram
- 5. Have the students complete a Venn Diagram with at least ten facts to compare and contrast the difference in facts from the book to the websites
- 6. Have the students share the facts that they found in the class discussion
- 7. Have students share their Venn Diagram with their assigned small group and provide positive feedback to their peers
