Overview and Rationale

We will be teaching the students how to use Library of Congress to research a famous person. We will teach them how to navigate around the site, on the board upfront so they can find information with ease. We will then explain how to create a BioPoem, using ours as an example. We will give explicit directions on what to write for each line. After the students have created their BioPoem we will teach them how to make a Wordle. We will again show them on the board how to navigate the website and then show our Wordle creation as an example. The students will use the words they have in the poem, to create the Wordle. Students gain knowledge using several resources in this lesson. It is important for students to learn how to use LOC because it houses many different learning opportunities and information they can use in many other aspects of schooling. It is also important that students learn how to use technology to create projects and document their learning.

Objective

The students will be able to use Library of Congress to research a person.

The students will be able to create a BioPoem based on the outline we provide.

The students will be able to create a Wordle based on their BioPoem.

The student will be able to explore both websites individually.

Materials

Procedure

- 1. Take students to the computer lab
- 2. Have students log on to LOC and give directions on how to navigate the website
- 3. After approximately 10 minutes, show students the example BioPoem
- 4. Explain to students the assignment and hand out directions
- 5. Give students 20-30 minutes to research a person and create their poem.
- 6. Regroup and introduce Wordle
- 7. Show an example on Wordle.com and have the students log in individually
- 8. Give students 15 minutes to create a Wordle.
- *Give students headphone for students with behavioral needs.
- *Give hard copies to all students of what is being explained in order to provide multiple sets of directions.

Make sure all students have a completed Biopoem and Wordle.

Students must follow the directions for the poem explicitly in order to receive full points.

Students completed their BioPoem and Wordle with facts from the LOC website.

The biopoem will be worth 10 points and the Wordle will also be worth 10 points.
