Overview and Rationale

In this lesson, students will be learning what a Bio Poem is as well as creating one of their own. They will choose a historical figure to research using the Library of Congress website. They will then write their BioPoem and, upon completing the poem, create a Wordle document. Students will benefit by learning how to utilize primary sources and how to summarize important details. They will also be able to visualize a connection between language arts and social studies.

Objectives

The students will...

- identify the characteristics of a BioPoem

- successfully create a BioPoem
- demonstrate how to use a primary source
- demonstrate internet proficiency

Materials

Computer

- Pencil
- Paper

Procedure

- 1. Introduce what a BioPoem is
- 2. Provide students with an outline of a BioPoem
- 3. Introduce the Library of Congress website
- 4. Allow students to select a historical figure
- 5. Have students research their selected figure
- 6. Students will create their BioPoem
- 7. Introduce students to Wordle
- 8. Have students create their Wordle
- 9. Have students print their Wordle
- 10. Students will then present their final products to the class

BioPoem Format:

Line 1-Write the first name of the famous person

Line 2-Three or four words that describe the famous person

Line 3-Where was the famous person born?

Line 4-Describe the time period in which he or she lived.

Line 5-Name a family member and their relationship to the famous person.

Line 6-How is this famous person best known in history?

Line 7-Name three things the famous person tried to accomplish.

Line 8-Name three important accomplishments.

Line 9-How is this person best known in history?

Line 10-Write the last name of the famous person.

Assessment

The students will present their BioPoem to the class. They will then turn it in for the teacher to grade using a rubric evaluating both the oral presentation as well as the written poem.
